



WHO IS THE CITY OF CAMDEN?

The City of Camden, New Jersey is directly across the Delaware River from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. It is the county seat and one of the largest municipalities in the state. Camden has faced challenges with illegal dumping at more than 50 sites that cost the city millions.

CAMDEN'S CHALLENGES BEFORE LVT:

- Monitor two heaviest illegal dumping sites that see 20–75 tons of dumping per year
- Collect video evidence of dumping for prosecutions
- · Add deterrence to sites to prevent dumping

LVT SOLUTIONS:

- · Assess the City of Camden's situation and needs
- Deploy two D3 Mobile Security Units to use at the most serve dumping locations
- Equip units with strobe and flood lights, a two-way speaker, infrared cameras, and license plate recognition
- · Access to 24/7 Monitoring
